Church "teams" (clergy and at least three lay members) will choose an area of focus and receive six months of group coaching, including Zoom calls, unlimited email coaching and a weekly newsletter. Focus areas include: Reaching new people, engaging in vision/discernment, funding your church's growth, developing an effective church structure, and creating a discipleship program. We are interested in hearing from anyone that would like to participate in this program. I'm particularly interested in Paul's idea that Linda Hirst mentioned on Sunday: Bringing ourselves to the community rather than trying to bring people to our church.
